The Interview

Each 4-H'er is encouraged to apply for an award **in which they qualify**. Criteria for each award is listed in this packet. Each member applying for an award will be required to complete the awards application and an interview with a panel of judges from outside the county. The interview portion is used to help determine the extent to which you actually participated in a project, what knowledge and skills were gained, and how you handle yourself when asked questions concerning your project or 4-H activities.

The interview will be 5-10 minutes long. During those 5 minutes, judges will ask questions regarding your project experience, as well as your community service and leadership activities.

TIPS FOR A WINNING INTERVIEW:

1. Prepare Yourself
 - The more prepared you are, the less anxious you will be at the interview.
 - Rehearse the interview.
2. Make Yourself Memorable
 - You can do it. Just remember first impressions count.
 - Look the interviewer in the eye.
3. Answering Questions
 - The interviewer(s) will ask you about yourself, so relax - no one knows you better than you do.
 - Sort out your background beforehand so that you are ready to bring up your most outstanding accomplishments.
4. Ending the interview
 - The interviewer(s) will usually indicate when the interview session is over.
 - Smile, thank the interviewer(s) for their time and leave the room in a dignified manner.

More Tips.....

- ✓ Arrive on time
- ✓ Shake hands firmly
- ✓ Do not chew gum
- ✓ Clothes and hair should be neat and tasteful
- ✓ No fad clothing - choose neat, clean, "business" type dress
(Remember - appearance is part of the score)
- ✓ Think about the question before immediately answering
- ✓ Be enthusiastic about 4-H
- ✓ Explain achievements or good characteristics in story form
- ✓ Give specific answers
- ✓ Be honest
- ✓ Practice, practice, practice - set up mock interviews
- ✓ Be yourself
- ✓ Enjoy the interview!

The best advice for an interview is to relax and enjoy the experience. Remember, you know more about your project or 4-H career than anyone else. Judges are looking for how comfortable you are with your project and knowledge of the subject matter. Never underestimate the power of a smile - judges are looking for the confidence that says you are enjoying the experience of presenting your project and yourself. Put your best appearance forward at all times.

ANDERSON COUNTY 4-H AWARDS

To be considered for any of the awards, the application must be completely and correctly filled out and returned to the Extension Office by the set deadline. Please read the criteria for each award before deciding to apply. Do not apply for awards in which you do not qualify, or any award you have previously received, or the application will not be considered. Awards will be determined based on the enclosed score sheet. The application will be scored and you will complete an interview with a panel of qualified persons from outside the county.

The following are the awards and requirements for each:

Gold Star Award - The Gold Star Award is the highest county achievement award

1. The member must be at least 15 years of age as of January 1 of the current year and must have completed at least 3 years in 4-H including the current year.
2. The 4-H member must have completed projects in three different project areas and have participated in one or more activities in at least three of the following areas:
 - Method Demonstration/4-H Presentation
 - Contests
 - Projects
 - Leadership Lab
 - Citizenship Activities
 - Camps
 - Public Relations (speeches, poster displays, radio, etc)
 - Other (includes exchange programs, fund-raising, Congress)

**** Note:** It is not expected that the above requirements for projects and activities all be completed in the current year. They may have been accomplished over the entire period of time the 4-H'er has been in the program.

3. During his or her years in 4-H, the member must have exhibited leadership skills by serving as a 4-H officer or committee chairman (club, county, district, or state), and/or as a junior or teen leader in an activity or project with or under the supervision of an adult volunteer leader.
4. The 4-H member must have participated in one or more community service activities. Examples are working or counseling with Junior 4-H members; participating in community service projects (individual, group, or club-type); and motivating other 4-H members through participated in demonstrations, projects and/or exhibits.

Silver Star Award – The requirements for the Silver Star are the same as the Gold Star Award, WITH THE EXCEPTION that the 4-H member must be classified as an Intermediate, and must have completed at least 1 year in 4-H. This is the highest award an Intermediate 4-H'er can win.

Bronze Star Award - The requirements for the Silver Star are the same as the Gold Star Award, WITH THE EXCEPTION that the 4-H member must be classified as a Junior, and must have completed at least 1 year in 4-H. This is the highest award a Junior 4-H'er can win.

Danforth "I Dare You" Award - The "I Dare You" Award is given in recognition of excellence of character and a well-balanced personal development as well as demonstrated leadership. The Danforth Award is open to Intermediate and Senior 4-H'ers only.

Rookie of the Year - (1 Junior, 1 Intermediate, and 1 Senior award given) - First year 4-H member - Member must have completed at least two projects and whose attitude and actions promote 4-H in the County.

Graduating Senior Award - Given to all 4-H'ers who are entering their high school Senior year (twelfth grade) and who meet the following qualifications:

1. Meet the Gold Star requirements
