ANXIOUS ANIMALS

reducing stress
in your show string

Your palms are sweaty and your mouth is dry. It's your first time giving a speech in front of a crowd this big. You're prepared, but your anxiety rises and your stomach flips and flops as you walk on the stage with all those spotlights shining on you! Or think about when you started a new school. Maybe it was a transition to Junior High or High School. Or even your first day of college classes. Will you go to the right room? Will you be on time? Will you have the right books and supplies?

If the above scenarios sound familiar, imagine the stress your animal experiences as it makes its first appearance at a show. It can't tell you, but chances are, it feels the same anxiety you might feel before giving a big speech or having an interview for a job or scholarship or even starting school. It's up to you – its owner and the exhibitor – to look for signs and help prevent those stressful situations that might happen at your animal's first show.

What could possibly cause your livestock project to stress out? After all, those days and weeks of feeding, washing, skin and hair care and exercising at home have all been leading up to this moment – show time. But, up until now, your animal has been bedded in its nice climate-controlled barn under the fans with your favorite music in the background. If it's a calf or hog you probably rinse it at least daily.

A new environment with new smells, sounds, sights and bedding will add stress to your animal just like walking onto a stage or entering a new school will for you. Common causes of stress for animals going to a show include: a new environment with a greater temperature variance than they are used to, unfamiliar sounds and sights like strangers wanting to pet them; a change in their routine – both the times and ways they are fed and worked with; changes in their bedding and being in a show ring with unfamiliar animals instead of their barn mates from home. Additional stressors for cattle include being tied in all day in a small stall space to lay down and using a show halter on show day instead of a typical rope halter.

Although "new" can be exciting, for our livestock companions "new" is usually nerve-wracking, causing the animals to go off feed and water and even acting anxious or less calm than they do at home.

Here are some ways to eliminate the "first show" jitters and help you and your animals have a successful first trip out.

1 – Stick to your routine. If you have a set feeding schedule at home, that shouldn't change just because you are at a show. Just like humans, animals adjust to a schedule, and like the pattern of organization. If you have a pattern of how you do things – feed, exercise, rinse – at home, then keep that same pattern at the show.

2 – Keep the environment as much the "same" as you can. If you have your Hamp barrow penned next to Duroc barrow at home, pen them that way at the show. If you play music in the barn at home, play music at the barn at the show, if you are not breaking any show rules. If you can bed on bedding like what you use at home, use that, to keep the animal more comfortable.

3 – Introduce your animal to the show ring before show day. No matter how well prepared you are, show day is typically a little crazy. Take your animal into the show ring prior to show day. If you are showing a lamb or calf, practice leading and setting up your animal. If you are showing a hog, exercise it in the show ring so it is familiar with the surroundings.

4 – Keep your animals eating and drinking. Sometimes our nerves hit right to the bottoms of our stomach, making us lose our appetite, and our animals are no different. Even the healthiest of animals are prone to go off feed when met with the major stressors of a show. Getting your show pig off to a good start is one of the most important aspects for feeders to consider. We call this phase of the project the “receiving” phase. This is one of the most stressful times in a show pig’s life and steps need to be taken to ensure that this transition from the breeder’s farm to your barn is as easy as possible for your pig(s). Laying the proper foundation from a nutritional standpoint is a key step when receiving baby pigs.

FEEDING & NUTRITION: Studies have shown it is advantageous to incorporate Amaferm® into a show pig’s diet at this stage. Amaferm is a natural feed additive that acts as a prebiotic which increases feed digestibility. Amaferm works best when fed to animals during high stress periods in their life making the receiving stage a perfect time to begin to introduce it.

There are two options for incorporating Amaferm into your pig’s diet; through Vita Charge® and Sure Champ®. Next, the feed ration that you choose should be somewhat similar to the breeder’s to make the transition to your show barn less stressful. Ask the breeder what feed the pig was on from a protein, fat, lysine, and medication standpoint and keep your pig on a feed that is similar. Several other important points in receiving are: facilities, environment and health.



FACILITIES & ENVIRONMENT:

Another significant step in successfully receiving baby pigs is to have the correct facilities. It is key to have your barn cleaned and disinfected before receiving your new set of pigs.

Have your shavings in place, feeder hung and a clean water source available before you bring your pig home ([Video: How to Set Up A Pen Pig Pen](#)). Make sure that both the feeder and water source is at the correct height so that the pig can easily reach them. As your pig grows throughout the season you will need to re-evaluate and change the height of their feeder and water source to make sure it is easily accessible. Be sure that your pig learns your water system. Some pigs may be used to a bowl waterer and some may already know a nipple waterer. Pay attention at the breeder's farm to see what type of water system your pig is accustomed to, and if it is different than yours, watch closely to ensure your pig becomes familiar with your water system and is drinking enough.

When you purchase a pig from a breeder it may be coming from a nursery or a "chip barn" setting. The younger your pig, the more likely it came out of the breeder's nursery facility. Why is this important? It is good to know the type of environment that a pig has been accustomed to so that you can try and keep its ambient temperature relatively close to what it is used to. Most nursery facilities are kept between 80-90 degrees. Pigs in a chip barn may be kept at a little wider temperature range. At any rate, pigs that are brought home at 6-10 weeks old do the best when temperature is kept at a comfortable level, as constant as possible. Be sure that your pens block any wind draft that may occur.

If you have a white or blue pig be sure that no sunlight can reach their pen. ([Read tips on show pig skin care.](#)) Having your facilities set up correctly and at a comfortable temperature is imperative to decreasing the stress on your project.

HEALTH:

Deworm your pigs a week to ten days after bringing them home, (or if you male pigs that need to be castrated waiting until castration time is also fine). This gives them time to adjust to their new environment and is important in managing their health. Talk to your breeder and ask if they have already been dewormed, if so, when and with what product so that you are up to speed on their current health needs. It is also a good idea to ask your breeder about any vaccinations that your pig has been given or about any boosters that they may need.

By being proactive from a nutrition standpoint, keeping feed rations consistent, and placing them in a clean and comfortable environment while closely monitoring their health, you will be making a successful and easy transition for your pig from the breeder's farm to your barn. We wish everyone the best of luck in this upcoming show season!



Major Livestock Show Updates and Rule Changes

Ft Worth Livestock Show

- Steers arrival will begin at Trinity park, it will not be available until 8am on Monday January 29th
- Swine will arrive to Farrington field on January 29th from noon-7pm, it will not open until 8am on the 29th
- Swine must have weight cards submitted by 10am on Tuesday January 30th
- Goats must submit weight cards by noon on January 27th. Minimum weight is 50lbs

San Antonio Livestock Show

- Breeding swine ownership deadline– December 1, 2017
- A Crossbred gilt show and sale was added and will be held February 7-9. 1 entry per exhibitor, gilts must be state validated and weight limits are 230-340
- Sheep & Goats will be allowed to pen together if they arrive together and pre-penning procedures will be outlined in the premium book
- ARB heifer breed additions– Brangus Optimizer, Brangus UltraBlack, Brangus UltraRed have all been added to the ARB division.
- Market Turkey Toms will be added again this year

Rodeo Austin

- Heifers– entries limited to 2 heifers be exhibiter
- Steers– AOB Red Division will be added to the steer show and classes will be determined upon arrival
- Lambs– 2 Dorper Classes will be added to the market lamb show.
- Turkeys– Tom Turkeys will be added back
- Swine– Weight divisions will be added to the crossbred breed. Only division champions will compete in the crossbred breed champion drive.
- Sale lot additions– 11 lots will be added to the Barrows and 12 lots will be added to the Steers

Houston Livestock Show

- Heifers– substitution fees have changed, prior to Feb. 1st= free, Feb. 2nd– March 1st= \$50 per entry, and after March 2nd= \$250
- Scramble Heifers– they will move in on Wednesday March 7th and Show March 8th
- Lambs– Adding 3rd class or Dorpers and increasing them by 6 sale lots
- Goats– adding 12 sale lots
- Turkeys– Tom turkeys will be added back, top 50 toms and top 50 hens will be sold in the Auction
- Barrows– Champion Drive weigh back increased by 5lbs per wave.
- Gilts– Gilts will be given pen assignments at 288 lot just like barrows and will use back and east dock to increase unloading times.
