Dog Care and Training

What is the project?

- My primary project this year was raising a Guide Dog for the Blind. This year was
 my 5th year in the project. Training a Guide Dog for the Blind is a 2-year process.
- I got my first dog when she was eight weeks old. "Miami" came to my home for the first 16 months of training. My second dog was Oak and my third was Volvo. My fourth was Pirate and my final guide dog was Hermosa.
- It is my job to teach her obedience skills and to expose her to all sorts of people and environments. I was required to do a lot of the basic training so that she could go on to be a Guide Dog. At 16 months, the dogs are recalled to the main training center in San Rafael, California. The dogs go through 8 more levels of training and testing in order for them to become a Guide dog for the Blind. Miami passed all 8 levels of testing.
- I have then gotten 4 dogs since my first, Oak, Volvo, Pirate and Hermosa. I have finished raising Oak, and she is now living a life in Oregon. Volvo is a working guide in Virginia. Pirate is a K9 buddy working with a boy who is visually impaired. Hermosa is back at campus completely her final training.

How has the project grown this year?

• The project has grown a lot in the past year. In our past year we have gotten over 10 new dogs in our club and 15 new members.

What have I learned?

- This program has been an inspiration and a giant learning experience for me. I have learned how to be responsible for training 24/7. I have the dog at school with me and on weekends and all the time. While it is sometimes really inconvenient, I have had the opportunity to instruct my friends on how to be around a guide dog and educate people in my community about what to do with a dog when she is "working."
- You have the dogs for 16 months and they become part of your family, but you have to realize that these dogs serve a greater purpose. That has been one of the hardest lessons this past year as I walked away from Miami and left her with someone else.





• Another thing that I learned in the project is working with others. Every month we get with other trainers and learn new things from the other trainers. This helps us not only learn new techniques, but also allows the dogs to learn new skills. We all work as a team to help the dogs succeed. I have had to learn to communicate not only with my fellow raisers, but also with State Directors and the National Organization.

Mentor Up

What is the project?

- This activity is inside of the citizenship and civil education project.
- This activity is all about serving those in your community. In this activity we go out into the community and help the older generation with technology.
- We help people in the library and in different nursing homes in the Georgetown area.
- This activity teaches kids to bridge the gap between the older generation and our generation by using technology. We share the knowledge that we have of it with someone who isn't as confident with technology as we are.
- All of the people that we help often do not have help outside of when we come, so it
 has been a tremendous blessing for me to be able to help someone in my
 community.

How did the project grown this year?

- This activity started about 6` years ago and has been growing ever since. Myself and 4 other kids in the program were the trailblazers for the project. We started out very basic by going to one nursing home and a couple of local events to spread awareness about what mentor up are.
- Today we are going to 2 local nursing homes twice a month, the local Georgetown library every week and now have about 10 mentors in the project.
- At the Georgetown Public Library the first hour and a half, is all tech support. We help one-on-one with anything that a person might need help with. This ranges from how to work their Ipad, to how to get books from the library online. Then after that hour of tech support, we present a class on current technology topics like using Google Docs, Pintrest posting, social media options and the different browsing programs.

What have I learned?

• The main thing that I learned from this is to be patient and how to listen with an open heart and mind. Many people that come to us are confused and sometimes





frustrated about their device. So we have to take a deep breath and help the person walk through how to work their device.

• The next most important skill that I learned was to really hear when someone is talking. Many people want to talk and tell stories about when they were growing up. Which I think is amazing. I love hearing about their past and it also makes the patrons more comfortable around you when you are interested in what they have to say. Overall this project has taught me many things personally and allowed me to help make a difference in my community.

Public Speaking

What is the project?

My challenge this year was to write a speech that both bought awareness about
Guide Dog community but also was able to be connected to the agriculture side of
4-H. I worked all year round with my 4-H project leader and even my vice principal
who was a speech and debate coach. I wanted to do my best in this project and on
my speech.

How has the program grown this year?

- This year we had two new students get interested in doing the project.
- This project also grown by competing at two more shows this year. We added one local show and one long-distance show to have the opportunity to show even more.
- We have also created a completely new club, called the gavel club that focuses on the toast master curriculum.
- We added senior-level competitors in on the team.
- This project continues to grow and have new students and topics every year.

What have I learned?

- I learned a lot this past year. The three major things that I learned were to research like crazy to know my topic inside and out, to practice my piece to perfection, and to always be open to suggestions.
- I had to do a lot of research about Guide Dogs and how they correlate with the agriculture business. I learned a lot about the history of dogs and how the service animal industry has evolved. I even found out about a blind poultry farmer who hires 5 other employees.
- Another thing that I had learned was to practice often during down times like
 driving or in the shower. I practiced every week for about 2 hours to memorize my
 speech to make that it would flow when I was competing. I wanted to make sure the
 speech was very well written but also flowed so that it would bring awareness to the
 Guide Dog community.





Leadership

What is the project?

• I am currently the President of the Georgetown 4-H club, the President of our county council, a district vice chairman and a part of the state technology team. I am also a county ambassador and an teen leader of the companion animal project in my club. By having these many different levels of leadership, I am also growing, but also able to share my wisdom and knowledge in 4-H to those around me.

How has the project grown?

• It has been my dream since I joined 4-H to have a leadership position at the Club, County, District levels. I finally achieved this goal this past year and I am beyond excited. I have not only be able to grow in my personal development as a leader, but I now am able to share my knowledge with others and my leadership to inspire the next generation of 4-H member.

What have I learned?

- I learned about dedication and responsibility. I had to be dedicated everyday to insure that I was working with my adult leaders at the club, county, district and state levels to insure that everyone was on the same page.
- I also had to be responsible to insure that I was able to be able to answer any questions and always be available to those who needed to discus plans with me.
- Overall this project has taught me the overall benefit of time management.
