This year is my first year in 4-H and I joined in August of 2018. I was excited to be able to continue my peewee lamb showing career by competing in market lamb classes with the big kids. I had a total of 3 lambs on feed throughout the year that were shown at a county show and two major shows. My main goal for the year was to the make the sale at the Leon County Youth Livestock

Show.

My first lamb in the barn was "Chip" and my goal when purchasing him was to make The State Fair of Texas Big Tex Youth Livestock Auction, while I didn't meet my goal this year I did learn a lot with Chip. This was my first time exhibiting at a major stock show. It was a big change from the small jackpot and ribbon shows that I am used to. I had to learn to be very patient; waiting in the trailer line was something that seemed would never end. It was very different for me to be responsible for weighing my animal in and digitally entering his information into the kiosk. Leading up to the show I learned about hard work and dedication through his feed and exercise routines. I also saw how changes in types and amounts of feed are very important to making your lamb be the best. Chip was the largest lamb that I had ever shown and it took lots of time and effort for us to become a team that performed well in the show ring.

I purchased my second lamb, d'Artagnan who I called Dart for short, in July from an individual breeder in South Texas. My parents and I made the five hour trip and arrived in time to evaluate all of the medium wool lambs in the auction. We had a couple of prospects that we agreed would serve me well and ended up winning the bid for lot #1. We started the long trip home and

thankfully the sun was going down and we were able to get him home without scorching hot temperatures. Once he arrived in the barn and I got him settled we started our long journey that ended at the Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo Medium Wool class #3. In the end Dart was my favorite lamb because he was so laid back, I loved how he "pranced" when he walked.

Last to the barn was Miss Itty. She was a diamond in the rough and when she moved in she weighed around 20 pounds. She was the easiest to train to walk and brace because of her size, but the older she got the feistier she seemed to be. She had a strict feeding and drench schedule in order for her to gain enough to reach the weight limit at the Leon County Show. Throughout the year I showed at several shows: September 1st Central Texas State Fair September 22nd Hico Livestock Show. Itty placed 1st, Dale placed 3rd, and Dart placed 4th. September 28th Check in for The State Fair of Texas lamb show September 30th Chip did not make the sale and was sold at floor price October 12th Heat O' Texas Fair Lamb Jackpot Show. Dart placed 2nd and Itty placed 10th. October 13th Heart O' Texas Fair Lamb Junior Show. Itty placed 10th and Dart didn't place. October 23rd I validated Dart and Itty at major show validation November 10th Crawford FFA Livestock Show. Itty placed 1st in her class and Overall Reserve Champion Lamb. December 8th Coryell County 4-H Christmas Classic. I showed both lambs in 2 rings. March 7th Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. Dart did not place and was sold at market price. April 17th Leon County Youth Livestock Show. I was Reserve Junior Lamb Showmanship, 3rd in class 1,

and 11th in sale order with Itty.

My first official show year came with many hardships. Soon after Itty won Reserve Champion Lamb at the Crawford FFA Show I started to notice she had gotten a fungus. I immediately began washing and treating her and Dart daily. I learned about having to do what was best for my lamb during the months that followed. It didn't matter if it was freezing outside there were times they had to be washed with their special shampoo and then blow-dried so they didn't get sick. During this setback I missed shows that I had intended on going to, but finally after a month I was able to come back to a show. I knew I had a lot of work to do to get them back to where they once were because while feeding and showmanship was still a priority their skin condition had been my main priority and focus. Slowly things returned back to normal and I was able to continue my show season.

Throughout my first year I learned things aren't always easy. Even when it's hard you have to keep pushing to get to the end result that you set out to accomplish. Although I didn't make sale at majors this year I did at county and I am very proud of myself for that.
