So Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service is offering a Kids Cooking Camp to teach basic cooking techniques, along with some other very important facets such as:

- Food Safety Rules

- Food Samples of Healthy Snacks and Foods
- MyPlate Nutrition Education
- Learning How to Cook economical Meals and Snacks

The children will also have the opportunity to learn about and participate in the Walk Across Texas exercise program. This will be a fun addition to the cooking class that will encourage students to develop the habit of daily exercise through a structured walking program. It is something they will do at home and hopefully involve the whole family! All students who complete the Walk Across Texas program will receive a prize at the end of the summer.

The program is a 4 Part Series that will meet at the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Conference Center on June 14 & 28, July 12, and August 2. There will be two sessions. 9:30 a.m. – Noon for Grades 1st – 2nd and 1:30 p.m. – 4:00 p.m. for Grades 3rd – 5th (these are the grades they just completed). The cost is \$40.00 for the entire series.

The deadline to sign-up is June 1, 2016. However, these sessions are limited to the first 20 registrants, so please register your child as soon as possible.
