


AGRICULTURAL Program Update

Once again we are rapidly approaching the Fall season. For our ranchers, this time of year usually means hay testing, preparation for winter pastures and hopefully an objective evaluation of both the financial and performance records of the cattle operation. I feel safe in saying it has been a good year for cattle prices in the U.S.A. The impact of market restrictions and overall cattle numbers in our nation have had much to do with this. 2004 Fall Educational Programs:

The **Fall Hay Evaluation** program has undergone a transition from the format of previous years. We will be testing hay again; however, we will not hold a dedicated "Hay Show" style program. Producers who submit samples for analysis will receive printed results at our **Winter Cattle Feeding Program** on October 14, 2004. If you are not in attendance at the program, we will mail your results to you with a feeding recommendation if needed. 

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Fumonisin Contamination in 2004 Texas Corn Crop

Dept. Plant Pathology, Texas A&M University Fumonisin, a fungal-produced toxin that can be deadly to horses, is again a problem in the Texas corn crop. According to the Office of the Texas State Chemist, 27% of 62 samples of the 2004 crop analyzed in early August had levels exceeding 5 parts per million (ppm). Nine counties in the Coastal Bend and Upper Coast production areas had samples that ranged from 6.3 to 88.7 ppm. It is possible that contamination may also be found in corn now being harvested from production areas in other parts of the state. Therefore, all corn should be tested, especially if it is to be fed to sensitive animals such as horses and rabbits.

The fungus that produces fumonisin is *Fusarium* verticillioides (older name is F. moniliforme). It is widespread in agricultural soils. It can grow as a saprophyte on crop residue and it is also a plant pathogen, causing an ear rot during periods of wet weather. The symptoms of this ear rot are a white growth on kernels, as well as white streaks on the kernel that have a radiating pattern (known as "starburst"). The fungus can infect and grow down the silks of intact ears, into intact kernels. Insects can aid in infection, by allowing the fungus easier entrance through open wounds, or by moving the fungus around. However, fumonisin can be a problem even in the absence of insect injury. Contamination can also occur in transgenic (Bt) hybrids.

The fungus infects the ear during the flowering period. Rainy weather during this time is a predisposing factor because it can disperse spores. Fumonisin can be produced shortly after infection. Contaminated corn may not have visible fungal growth. The highest levels of toxin production have been measured at 20% kernel moisture, while toxin production ceases below 18% kernel moisture. Fumonisin can also be a post-harvest problem if grain is stored at improper moisture contents and/or temperatures.

As is the case with aflatoxin, the level of

contamination with fumonisin can vary from kernel to kernel. This variation can confound subsequent detection of contamination if care is not taken with sample size and sampling technique. Since there is a high association of fumonisin with broken kernels, it may be possible to reduce levels in contaminated grain by removing them.

Grain contaminated with fumonisin may also be contaminated with aflatoxin, even though there are differences between them in factors predisposing grain to contamination.
