

Fruit and Nut Tree Recommendations

Pomegranates, persimmons, figs, jujubes, pears and grapes do really well in Williamson County on our predominately alkaline, heavy clay soils.

Peaches, plums, apricots, nectarines and apples all prefer soils that are acidic without much calcium which is rare in Williamson County. In these high pH soils they develop problems with the disease cotton root rot and have severe problems with iron chlorosis. They are generally not recommended here except in far southeast Williamson County.

- Regal ripens 5/10-5/20; 700 chill hours; yellow, cling
- Bounty ripens 7/1-7/15; 850 chill hours, free
- Majestic ripens 7/15-7/20; 850 chill hours, free
- * In alkaline soils use Lovell or Halford rootstock
